One is surely to be credited if going to a quilt exposition is an adventure, but that is exactly what it felt like to me, and to all the people who were lucky enough to see the De nver National



Quilt Show. The Comfort Inn was full of ladies and gentlemen carrying their current knitting projects and luggage, respectively. I would have laughed but I had my own knitting, and so did many who were there at lectures. (Touchy feely types of people

who have to keep their hands busy or who knows what they would be in a cast of thousands.)

This is one show where I could not bring myself to vote. I ran out of time, for one, and it was so rich in talent and experience and ideas that it was not possible. I think 400 quilts were in the show. Those who commented on Houston or Chicago made me appreciate this one all the more.

The quilts made by people who were greatly impacted by alzheimers were heart wrenching and so caringly finished. Thi s is a touring exhibit,



and pictures were not allowed.

New Mexico Quilter's Assoc. entered a selection in the group category to accompany the Colorado state exhibitors. And mini shows were included that featured a star quilter by hanging a theme selection n of their own design.

The food court was necessarily visited to refocus one's eyes and ground oneself again, for the next go around. Merchants filled an awesome floor space, and I shopped and watched, and had very nice conversations with



vendors, whose booths were more of the surprising variety in scope and creativity, by down home up town needlers. Two days from 10 am to 6pm I spent in one building before attending

evening lectures. More men than ever were in participation.

One was John Flynn from Montana, who became a quilter when men did not do such



things. He is retired now, and sells unusual lap frames for home or travel. His trade was started when he was a civic engineer and needed a calm evening activity. Flynn is a natural comedian; we la ughed at his stories, and saw beautiful work. Then we packed his suitcases with him. The red case he called catsup, one case bright yellow he called mustard. It was a picnic!


