### TREASURER'S REPORT - Donna


The Enterprise Checking account balance on March 1, 2022 was \$8188.57 - Donna

Linda K. called the meeting to order at 7:06.

Officers Reports

Vice President – Brenda announced that Jeni Kay Parks lecture and workshop has been rescheduled to the August guild meeting. Lecture on Aug. 23, and Workshop titled "Dangerous Curves" scheduled for Aug. 24 from 9-4.

Julia Goen, LAP guild member, will present a workshop on May 25 titled "Landscapes". Both workshops are \$45.00 each for members and \$55.00 dollars for non- members. Sign up sheets are available at meetings or contact Brenda.

Secretary - Deb M. reports no changes or corrections.

Treasurer – Donna has no report and if info is needed please check newsletters.

Committee reports

Community Service - no report, check newsletter for information from CS coordinator.

Membership – Clara reminds everyone that dues are still \$25.00 and need to be paid for 2022 if you have not done so.

Newsletter – Laura thanked Joan for doing the newsletters in her absence.

Publicity – Joan reported that notice of the February meeting on media outlets was not possible and will keep trying for future meetings.

Webmaster - Deborah, no report

UFO's Challenge-no information yet. Linda will contact JoAnn to discuss if she is interested in continuing as coordinator.

Shelly introduced a new guest, Emma, who is a quilter and family friend.

Announcements- Lana brought a applique quilt of NM Mission Church blocks that will be used as a raffle quilt for Our Lady of the Assumption in Jemez Springs. The proceeds will be used to build a wheel chair ramp. Tickets can be purchased from Lana or at Atomic City Quilts or online.

The Jemez Springs Bear Paws will resume their annual quilt show at the Madonna Hall in Jemez Springs, July 22,23,24.

Show and Tell-Christy designed and sewed a top inspired by a tile pattern she saw on a bathroom floor in Spain. The quilt will be given to her grandson.

Donna showed a BOM from Bear Paws that was doubled in size from the original number of blocks and she added hand embroidered blocks to bring it up to size.

Program: Thread, Thread, Thread.

Donna Smith, Speaker. Donna says that there are certain facts regarding thread. First, today's thread is specialized for every use. Second, today threads are of better quality than in the past. Third, all thread today is made as Perl cotton except for polyester wrapped and monofilament which is shot out of a nozzle.

There are many good brands of thread but Donna's advice is to always purchase thread from a quilt store either in person or online.

Donna posed the question, "How do you know when good thread is too old to use for anything that is sewn on the machine?" She picks up a spool and draws about 18 " of thread and pulls it. If she can hear a pop when it breaks it is still good.

Thread should be stored out of the sun and dust in a covered box or drawer.

Thread is wound in two ways; stack wound and cross wound. This determines how you set your thread on your machine.

Thread weight; Donna jokes that there are 5 systems telling you what thread weight means but it doesn't dictate what you do with the thread. Starting with a 60 wt. which is the lightest you can use silk, an Aurifil thread or Bottom Line. The majority of 50 wt. thread is cotton and generally used for piecing. 40 wt. is still a medium weight thread and is 3-ply. An example that we are familiar with is King Tut. Polyester thread that is 19 wt. is not great for machine quilting. It is used for hand quilting and use on flannel but is not good for cotton or batik.

Razzle and Razzle Dazzle can be used for bobbin work or ornamental use. It is too big for machine needles.

Cotton thread is a great thread for most uses. Polyester thread can be used but is shiny as well as rayon thread but may not be the look you want. If using monofilament polyester thread be sure to use a netted sock to control the spool and she reminded us to reduce the top tension on the machine. Rayon thread does not hold up for quilting but is useful for embroidery machines. Silk thread is super strong and light weight but very expensive. Example; 220 yds. For \$6.00.

Donna enjoys hand quilting some of her quilts. She uses Gutterman's hand quilting thread. It is hard and waxy and reminded everyone to never use it in a machine. She recommends using Thread Magic or bee's wax if using any other brand of thread for hand quilting.

Donna had some fun decorative threads to show. She brought a Superior hologram thread that is not metallic but does sparkle.. She advises that when using metallic thread to use a top stitch needle or a metallic needle.

Donna had advice for machine needle types and machine tension. She suggests using a 80 or 90 size needle but finds 90 top stitch needle most useful for her because of the type of thread she uses. The needle has a larger eye and is designed to give her the best look. She changes the needle every 8 hours of working and if she hears a popping sound when the needle lifts from fabric she changes the needle regardless of the time on the machine.

In closing she had more advice. If you are experiencing thread breakage you can go to the Superior Threads website and find a flow chart for troubleshooting thread issues. She also suggests cleaning your machine daily. If you are experiencing skipped stitches try rethreading or change the needle. She finds "pokies" really annoying when free motion quilting and looks at her top tension as the culprit as it may be too tight.

Linda thanked Donna for once again bringing a very informative program and reminded everyone that the next meeting will be March 21 in White Rock.

Meeting adjourned at 8:45.
