Sept Mtg

LAP will be hosting Debbie Maddy for the Sept 27th mtg (7pm) and Sept 28th workshop (9am to 3pm). Both meeting and workshop will be at United Church/Graves Hall.

Debbie has studied with Shibori masters, mainly in Japan, and her lecture on the 27th will be a combination slide/trunk show. She will discuss the concept of Shibori and the various techniques; show slides of her studies in Japan; and display a collection of hand dyed fabrics and quilts made from Shibori fabrics.

Her workshop on the 28th is "Shibori Resist with Indigo Dyeing." We will make an Indigo vat first thing in the morning, and then set to work on tying fabric for dyeing using a variety of fun and interesting techniques and objects.

Workshop cost is \$45 for members, and \$55 for non members. There is an additional \$25 supply fee. Prepared fabric or a scarf for dyeing will also be available for purchase at the workshop. Donna Smith has indicated she has a bolt of already prepared muslin for dyeing that she is willing to share.

Call to Order 7:05

We welcome one new visitor, Kathy.

Officer reports

Vice Presidents-Shelly presented thank you cards to all volunteers that helped out with the de-stash sale. Shelly also explained the details for the "telephone" mini swap. The list of participants will be divided into smaller groups. In the first round each quilter will receive a photo and will use any quilting technique to produce a 12"x12" quilted and bound mini quilt based on how the photo inspired them. In the next round the second quilter will only receive a photo of the mini quilt and gather inspiration from the mini and never see the original photo. Quilters will have two months to render a mini quilt and when four rounds are completed there will be a reveal of the

photo and the collection of the four mini's. Shelly would like to have a presentation of this swap at the Quilt Show in 2023.

In September, Debby Maddy, will present a program recalling her adventures and experiences while learning the Shibori resist technique of hand dying fabric. She will hold a workshop on Wednesday Sept. 28 on Shibori resist dying. Both meeting and workshop will be held at the United Church. Cost for workshop is \$45.00 for members and \$55.00 for nonmembers.

Brenda wanted to remind members that the pot-luck will be in October.

Committee reports

Community Service- Flo has three quilts left after dropping off six quilts at the ATU department at the hospital. Flo has begun to show photos of the quilts given to Community Service on our Facebook page.

Membership-Clara reminds all that the new membership forms are in the newsletter. There is an increase of dues to \$35.00 per year and workshops will increase to \$55.00 for members in 2023.

Newsletter- Laura thanked Joan for doing the newsletter this month.

Publicity- Joan is still working on getting media outlets to announce our meetings and workshops. They do not update their webpages so it's hit or miss with them.

Webmaster- Deborah states that our website carrier has undergone various trial and error experiences. With a lot of back and forth emails between them and Deborah, she is happy to report that we are up and running.

UFO's – Joan has the clipboard and money pouch. Members are encouraged to sign-up and predict how many UFO's they will finish by the November meeting. They put in a dollar for every project they expect to finish. At the November meeting they bring the finished projects by showing the item or photo of the item. For every UFO that is finished a slip of paper with their name is put into the box. A drawing is held and two lucky quilters split the money.

Sunshine report- Donna Smith is doing well after undergoing her first hip replacement. Her second is scheduled for October. JoAnn Painter is presently at Sombrillo recovering from complications related to a fall. UPDATE JoAnn passed away 9/9/22.

Program- Jenny Kae Park started out in the quilting business in 2000. She began as a quilt shop worker. She has filmed over 150 videos for various companies demonstrating various quilting techniques. Her talk is titled "Confessions of a Fabric Snob." Her involvement with fabric makers and designers has given her appreciation for better quality fabric. Jenny has come tonight to share information on what to look for when buying finer fabric. She suggests that buyers should start with the thread in the fabric and observe the warp and weft. All fabric starts out as grey goods. Grey goods are woven but untreated. Fabric companies will contract with the factories and determine the type of sizing they want to be added to the warp thread so it won't break while

processing. That treatment determines the quality of the fabric. The second feature to look for in fine fabric is the hand of the fabric and the third is the color.

But the most important feature overall is the predictability of the line of fabric. The quilter should be able to expect that when fabric is cut or ripped that it will be straight of grain. You should be able to cut, stitch and press your fabric and have it remain stable and not stretch out of the shape. Brand names are a good indicator but not a guarantee. So look for no stretch in the crossgrain in the selvedge edge and minimal stretch on the side to side and a lot of stretch on the bias. It should contain a "soft hand" and good drape. Also check the fabric using the blouse test. You don't want to see through it.

Jenny has tips for prewashing or not prewashing. She only prewashes when there is a compelling reason. She washes if she is using blue or red fabric. She uses color catchers in her washing machine. She always washes flannel fabric but chooses to not wash most other fabric. She recommends using her starching technique before cutting. She first sprays fabric with water to get it wet then she sprays it with fabric starch. She likes the Faultless brand. Then she irons the wet fabric dry being careful not to scorch it. This produces a stable product to cut and sew without stretch.

Jenny closed by suggesting that quilters buy the best fabric they can afford and to finish quilts and use up as much of their stash fabric as possible.

Show and Tell- Brenda brought two former workshop projects to share. The first wall hanging was a combination of the Shannon Brinkley Fabric Collage workshop where she designed a bear and Stencil class taught by Michelle Watts where she added stars. Her second wall hanging was a still life applique from the Landscape class taught by Julia Goen.

Micki told the story behind the Hogan potholder she received for her donation to promote the issues important to the Native American community.

Renita brought a block from a quilt she is making for a friend for Christmas. She found the quilt pattern in an old magazine. In that same magazine she read an article about a woman who collects treadle sewing machines. Renita also collects vintage machines and she then exchanged emails and enjoyed finding a fellow collector.
