Program

Debbie Maddy with the Art of Shibori

She sewed when she was very young-mostly garments. In the early 70's she made her first quilt but went back to sewing garments until the early 80's when she made a king size quilt.

She went to Houston and took quilting and dying classes 9 years ago. She was hooked. She has been to Japan, England and all over the U.S. studying and teaching Shibori and Indigo. Indigo is the only natural blue dye, it comes from a green living plant. The dye is in the leaves.

She did a slide show showing her visits to England and Japan. The workshops in Japan were with Bryan Whitehead who lives in Japan and studies and grows Indigo. She showed slides of her time in Japan. The classes were with people from all over the world.

She talked about the fabrics she designs. How the fabric for Shibori is manipulated-clamps, folding, stitching, pole wrap, slinky. Inspirations for designs which included man hole covers-which are very elaborate in Japan. She showed a vat of dye. The liquid was orange, when the fabric comes out it is green the air turns it blue. This is what we will work with in the class tomorrow. She explained the dying process which has many steps.

Questions -

Is Indigo dye colorfast? Yes if done right. It needs to be finished out.

Are blue jeans true indigo? They are synthetic indigo not natural.

When manipulating the fabric what thread would you use for stitching? Bonded nylon or heavy upholstery thread.

How long does a vat last? If made right it can last a long time.

Fun Facts about Quilting/Quilters

The average quilter is 63 years old, retired, and owns 4 or more machines.

"Dedicated quilters" (those who spend more than \$500 per year on quilting) buy on average 99 yards of fabric a year, almost an entire football field's worth.

Dedicated quilters usually spend an average of \$3,363 on quilting supplies per year.

Beginner quilters spend an average of 6.9 hours a week on their craft. Advanced quilters spend around 17.6 hours.

Dedicated quilters spend almost 8 hours online per week visiting quilting sites and groups centered on quilting techniques, supplies, and news.

Quilting was a \$3.7 billion industry in 2017.
