We had a wonderful September meeting with Liz Martineau, Linda Zwick & Julie Filatoff presenting their amazing works in handmade books. If I were to list my favorite ideas, we might be here awhile! Suffice it to say - all 3 ladies are quite talented and I will look for their works in the future! Thank You Ladies!

October will be the annual Potluck - bring your favorite dish to share. Don't forget the serving items needed for your treat. Just a reminder, this meeting will start at 6:00 (one hour early) so we have time for food & a few games (Prizes to the table that wins!). We will meet at the United Church in Los Alamos.

November will be our annual sew-a-thon (more details provided below). Meeting is moved to the 19th due to Thanksgiving and 6:00pm (one hour early) and this will be held at White Rock Presbyterian. Please get a group of 2-3 ladies together to form your team. Note from Shelly - as we are making these quilts for charity, text me (505-500-5774) and I will help you pick charm packs & fabrics that would work great. Also, ACQ will give you 20% off if you call Shelly. (She has some new boy print charms!). Also, we will vote on final QAL for 2025.

LAP 2024 Sew-A-Thon

As the Sew-A-Thon approaches, please prepare before meeting:

For each group (2-3 people) you will need:

- (2) charm packs
- (1.25) yards neutral.

Think white/white-on-white/light grey/light cream/light read-as-solid

(2) yards background

Pick a color from charm pack that you want to use as an accent (I used a light rose tone-on-tone)

Cut neutral into (8) 5" WOF strips. Subcut into (64) 5" squares

Cut background into (8) 9" WOF strips. Subcut into (31) 9" squares.

Sewing:

Using (64) printed charms & (64) 5" neutral squares, create (32) 4-patch blocks. (seams pressed to dark, then to one side or other).


4-patch example

Bring (32) 4-patch blocks & (31) 9" background blocks. You will see something wonderful happen to the 4-patch blocks!

DON'T FORGET: At the meeting, you will also need (1) sewing machine, iron/board (every 1-2 teams) & rotary mat/cutter/ruler supplies (able to cut 9" squares).

Finished size = 59.5" x 76.5" (Think a generous teen size!)

Linda welcomed visitors Gordon, David, Julie, Stephanie.

Officer reports

President-Linda reports 120 placemats were sewn and will be delivered to the Senior Centers for distribution to those receiving home delivered meals. Linda introduced Carolyn, who brought fabrics and items from JoAnn Painter's estate to sell with proceeds to go to the TOTH resale shop.

Linda has a bag of LAP pins to be given out free as her attempt to recruit a new president for the guild in 2025. She counts 9 years as president so it's time to pass the baton. Linda maintains that this position "is not hard or complicated".

Vice Presidents-Brenda/Shelly. Brenda announced there were still spaces for the cyanotype workshop offered by LAP and SAQA on September 28. The opening reception of the SAQA show at the Mesa Public Library's Step Up Gallery will be held from 2-3:30 on September 28.

The October meeting will be the annual pot-luck. We begin the evening with dinner at 6:00. This is an hour earlier for our meeting and we will meet at the United Church. In November we will meet in White Rock for the sew-a-thon. Material list is in the August newsletter.

Sunshine Report- Ann Daley is recovering at home.

Program-Book Art with Liz, Julie and Linda. Liz began the program by talking about her journey from the struggle to work on large quilts to discovering small fiber art pieces she could finish and assemble into books. She found through using color, shapes and fiber as her palette she could create a project that expressed everything she was not able to express when working on one of her UFO's patchwork quilts.

She taught her students at the middle school the art of fiber pop-up books as a fun way to approach their studies. Her first fiber book was completed in 2011. It was a cloth book filled with lots of different buttons to tell her story. Liz joined the Santa Fe Book Arts Group and found them very encouraging with helpful inspiring ideas and tips. She

explained that there are many different ways to do book art. A book can be wrapped around a spool or hanging on a wall or accordion shape. Unusual shapes are encouraged as she showed a table runner book that snaked down the table in the form of a river.

Julie continued the book art presentation by showing altered book "story books" and scrolls. She recommends Timtex as a useful fiber interfacing for bookmaking projects. She enjoys using hand dyed fabrics as well as commercial prints in her work.

Linda, the next presenter, explained the special way she entered the art of making an art book. She was looking for a way to help recover from the loss of her mother when a mentor and friend suggested they work on a book. This friend supported her through the year long process. The project has brought many happy memories to Linda as she copes with her loss. Linda found that making pop-up books a fun and enjoyable project. She showed several pieces she made with the help of classes she found on the internet via zoom.

For those interested in learning more about the Santa Fe Book Art Group, go to their website at SantaFeBAG.org. They meet online the second Saturday of the month from 1-3 on zoom.

Liz presented a fiber art postcard project to the guild members. Please return the "art piece" postcard in the envelope provided at the October meeting. Do not sign it but mark the envelope somehow so in the exchange you do not receive yours.

Show and Tell- Trish wanted members to visit the Espanola Fiber Arts Co-0p to see her exhibit "Rags". The center is open Thursday, Friday, Saturday from 10-5.

Melodie showed an example of a project that could be made into a traditional fiber book but she sewed it together as a wall hanging with the blocks inspired from the You Tube channel of K3n clothtales.

Susan showed a birthday present she gave to her husband. It was a fabric photo using the sublimation printing technique of his elk antler shed collection. She framed the photo with fabric and then added quilting.

Donna added a finished king size UFO to her collection. This was a Jenny Beyer BOM with aqua tones and a fabulous printed border.

Debby finished a three yard quilt of blue and brown fabric. The original pattern had too many design problems for Debby so the cluster gave a few suggestions that she liked better. The same sewn blocks were arranged differently giving the layout a much more balanced and pleasing look according to Debby.
